Thanks to funding from the grant, we also participated in a steering committee to develop training modules for everyone involved in the construction process.

As we near our one-year anniversary of opening the ReSource Depot, we are amazed at the impact it's had on the St. John environment. With close to 500 volunteer hours, numerous donations, and excellent sales, we kept about 14,000 pounds of waste out of local landfills this year. We also recently expanded our hours at the ReSource Depot (see box below)., which is now open Saturdays from 10 a.m. to noon, Mondays from 7:30 a.m. to noon.



If you haven't had the chance to stop by, the ReSource Depot is located near the intersection of Gifft Hill and Centerline roads, across the street from the Susannaberg transfer station.

We've got several containers full of donated building materials, including doors and windows, plumbing and electrical supplies and fixtures,



paint, tools, lumber, and hardware, which are generally consistently in stock. At the time of publication, we also had some unique items for sale like a fabulous wall-mounted, motor-driven fan with 20 palm leaf blades, aluminum storm shutters, and a stainless steel Wolf downdraft range vent, all pictured.
